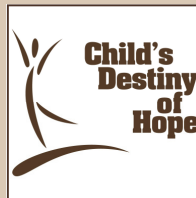

Our Vision:

“ Help the destitute, less privileged, poor and/or orphaned young by setting up a home, school and activity center where individual talents are discovered, encouraged and stimulated...trying to give them HOPE for the future. With this, we hope to share with them the Love of God that has touched and changed us too”.

In line with this, we would like to help the local communities by doing 'community work'. We plan to give social education, counseling and guidance in anticipation of creating a healthy family life – something that greatly misses in the local communities.

Uganda

Uganda is a country located in East Africa with a population of 31 million. Close to 3 million children have been left orphaned. Out of the 3 million children around 950.000 have lost their parents due to AIDS and another big percentage have lost their parents due to malaria and other diseases. There are also many children living under very poor circumstances, without any hope. The last information shows that 2 million children between 5 and 15 years old are 'employed'. Sad!

According to the Uganda National Household Survey, a vulnerable child is one who lives in a child-headed household or is a child laborer, an orphan, a child not in school, an idle child (that is, one without work or school), a married child, a child living in a household headed by an elderly person, a non-orphaned child not living with his or her parents, or a child living with a disability. By this definition, 65 per cent of children in Uganda fall under the category of 'orphans and other vulnerable children'. In real numbers, there are more than 2.2 million orphans and nearly 8 million vulnerable children in Uganda today. And nearly half of the country's orphans have lost one or both parents to the AIDS pandemic. (UNICEF)

What we plan to do in the coming months

We have the Kampala Hope and the Chawolo Hope centers. The Kampala Hope takes care of 7 orphaned children (home and school) plus financially supporting one child to attend school (he stays with his single father). We would like to continue expanding this ministry (increase the number of children we take care of and linking them with their sponsors through regular communication).



In the East of Uganda, there is a very needy village with the name C h a w o l o , which lacks all basics. We

have been offered 10 acres of land here. We plan to build a fully operational CDHope home at Chawolo in the given land starting from 2010-2014. We would like to start helping this village by operationalizing the existing clinic (employing a doctor and nurse) which we also have the authority to administer. We also would like to help the children and families of this village right from where they live by sponsoring their education and catering for their social and spiritual wellbeing.

Background

In July 2007, CDHope sent out Tim & Wilma Omalla, and their twin sons Eugene and Jaimie to Uganda. For years Tim & Wilma had the desire to make a difference in the lives of many hopeless and helpless children. In February 2008 Tim & Wilma started by helping the first 2 children right from their house in Kampala. They have 7 children living in their compound now. These children go to a local school and have a good home. There are many more children in need and CDHope wants to help them....
